Context:

 - The cycle (theme) presented
 - The hypophora argumentation (Q and A)

The Universal Need of Justification:

The moralist's self-righteousness

***Read Romans 2:1-11

1. God's judgment is righteous

1- God's judgment is righteous v. 1

- "Therefore" (Cf. Romans 1:18-32... esp. 32)
- Who is "without excuse"?
- What does it mean to be "without excuse"?
- Why is this person "without excuse"?

[My translation]

2:1 Therefore, you are without excuse, O man, whoever is judging, for in which you judge another, you condemn yourself, for the one judging, is doing the same.

- 1. God's judgment is righteous
- 2. God's judgment is known

2- God's judgment is known v. 2

- Who is "we" (1st person plural)?
- What is the "judgment of God"?
 - It is according to truth
 - It is against those doing these things
 - It is elaborated in the following verses.
 - It is related to the concept of a hardened heart
 - It has a connection to end times judgment (cf. 2 Thessalonians 2:1-12)

2:2 But now we have known the judgment of God is according to truth against those doing these things.

- 1. God's judgment is righteous
- 2. God's judgment is known
- 3. God's judgment is restrained

3- God's judgment is restrained vv. 3-4

- 2 questions:
- 1- do you think you won't be judged?
- 2- do you not understand the purpose of God's kindness

3 Do you imagine this, O man who is judging the one doing these and *also* doing the same, that you will escape the judgment of God?

4 Or are you looking down on the wealth of His kindness, forbearance, and patience, being ignorant that the kindness of God leads you to repentance?

3- God's judgment is restrained vv. 3-4

- Is this person a believer or unbeliever?
- Does it matter?

- Either way you go you must keep Paul's point in mind. Every person has a universal need to be justified. He is focusing on the sinfulness of man and the expected judgment. He hasn't gotten to justification yet.

5 But because of your unrepentant and hardened heart you store up for yourself wrath in the day of wrath and revelation of God's righteous judgment 6 Who will give each according to his works; 7 to those who by patient endurance of good work, are seeking glory and honor and immortality, eternal life; 8 but to those who from selfish ambition, are disobedient to the truth but obedient to unrighteousness, anger and wrath.

When is this day of wrath?

• Several views are argued but to name a few:

(Popular) – many say this is the GWTJ

(Arguable) – Rene Lopez argues for temporal judgment with the first mention of wrath and 70th week of Daniel with the second mention of wrath.

(Preferred) – This is speaking of the wrath of the DotL

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- $\dot{\alpha}\pi\sigma\kappa\alpha\lambda\dot{\upsilon}\psi\epsilon\omega\varsigma$ ("revelation" = The return of Christ)
- This would make for an emphasis on the imminency of Christ's return.

- Because it is considering that those alive when Paul is speaking these things will be the recipients.

- Why are there quotes in verse 6?
 - OT concept (cf. Job 34:11; Ps. 62:12; Jer. 17:10)
 - Also see Revelation 2:18-23

- Why are there quotes in verse 6?
- What "truth"? (cf. 1:18-25)

- Judgment and not justification is in view. Paul hasn't gotten there yet. He is cementing the case that there is a universal need for justification. SO here Paul is arguing that the one who judges someone for doing the list of things in verses 29-31condemns himself because he does them too.

- 1. God's judgment is righteous

5- God's judgment is impartial vv. 9-11

- God does not judge based on "race"
- God does not judge based on gender
- God does not judge based on influence
- God judges based on righteousness

9 Distress and trouble, upon every soul of man committing evil, both of the Jew first, and of the Greek, 10 but glory, honor, and peace to every man doing good, both of the Jew first, and of the Greek.

11 For there is no partiality with God.

- Have you trusted Christ?
