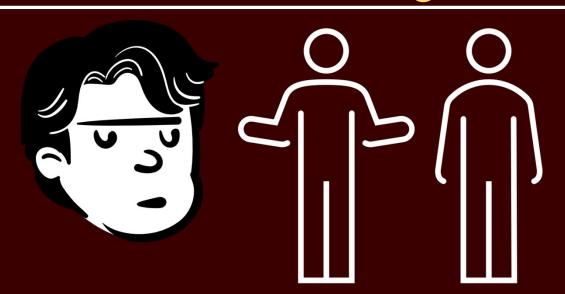

Which one did the will of their father? v. 31

Son #1:

- "Go work" v. 28
- "I will not" v. 29a
- *then went v. 29b

Son #2:

- "Go work" v. 30a
- "I will, sir" v. 30b
- *did NOT go v. 30c

1. The conduct of the religious leaders vv. 28-32

Jesus explains parable:

- Those who enter and don't v. 31b
- The reason v. 32
 - > John came and you didn't believe v. 32a
 - > Tax collectors and harlots did v. 32b
 - > Persistent unbelief v. 32c

1. The conduct of the religious leaders vv. 28-32

B. Determining what to do:

- > John's ministry was the "change agent"
- > "religious" did NOT believe
- "sinners" believed
- > "religious" persisted in unbelief

What builds faith and what contributes to doubt?

B. Determining what to do:

- > Jesus' parable exposes their conduct
- > Jesus reveals their consequence
 - The kingdom will be taken from them
 - It will be given to someone else.

3. The Judgment vv. 1-14

- > "them" v. 1 (cf. 21:23-24)
- > A marriage arrangement v. 2
- > Invitations sent v. 3
- > Everything is ready v. 4
- > Some ignore, the rest kill vv. 5-6

3. The Judgment vv. 1-14

- > "Murderers destroyed; city burned v. 7
- > Unworthy invitees v. 8
- > Free invitation sent out vv. 9-10
- > "But" *inciting incident v. 11
- ➤ No wedding garment vv. 11-12

3. The Judgment vv. 1-14

- > "Cast into outer darkness" v. 13
- > "many are called but few are chosen" v. 14

- > What is outer darkness?
 - 1) Gehenna. (HELL)
 - 2) Loss of rewards/privileges in the kingdom.
 - 3) Barred entrance into the kingdom.

- > What is outer darkness?
 - 1) Gehenna. (HELL)
 - The audience is unbelievers
 - The wedding feast is signifying kingdom
 - Entering w/out garments? (cf. Mt.18:3; 19:23)
 - Losing salvation? (cf. Jn. 10:24-30)

- > What is outer darkness?
 - 2) Loss of rewards/privileges in the kingdom
 - The audience is unbelievers
 - This IS a true doctrine
 - Introducing this is contextually foreign.
 - Penal consequences at BEMA?

- > What is outer darkness?
 - 3) Barred kingdom entrance
 - The audience is unbelievers
 - The wedding feast is signifying kingdom
 - Entering w/out garments? (unworthy)

- > What is outer darkness?
 - 1) Gehenna. (HELL)
 - 2) Loss of rewards/privileges in the kingdom.
 - 3) Barred entrance into the kingdom.

- > Audience: Unbelieving leaders
- > Church not revealed
- > IF bema-seat then penal consequences
- > Unbeliever (unworthy) are barred entrance

The parable reveals the judgment of THESE religious leaders and THIS unbelieving generation.

"many are called but few are chosen" v. 14

- > "called" is same root as "invite" (cf. vv. 4, 8, 9)
- "chosen" (ἐκλεκτοί) context carries a sense of qualitative description. (worthy)
- Better translated:
 "Many are invited, but few are worthy"

The judgment is because of their unworthiness, though the kingdom was ready; the invitees were unwilling! (cf. v. 3)

Summary/Application:

- > Religious leaders were obstinate in unbelief.
- > Their unbelief made them unworthy of the kingdom.
- Those who are "unworthy" are cast into outer darkness.
- > Jesus invited 1st century Israel to enjoy the ready kingdom.
- > They were unwilling.



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
